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TITLE OF THE FULL PAPER (TIMES NEW ROMAN 16 points)

Abstract (Times New Roman 14 points)

You are kindly asked to start with an abstract of no more than 100 words. Please tell clearly about your presentation's subject, aims, research task or problems and methods, data, and main results and conclusions.

These are instructions for the full paper submission. The full paper should be written on size A4 paper with 1.5 spacing. Font style is Times New Roman, 12 points (with the exception of the 16 pt title and 14 pt sub-title). Margins are: above 36,85 points, below 34 points, left 56,7 points and right 42,55 points. One empty line should be left between paragraphs. The length of full paper should be 3-8 pages. Use 1.0 spacing in the abstract.

Keywords: Include 3-5 keywords. The first keyword should be taken from the title.

1. The structure of full paper (Times New Roman 14 points)

The structure of the empirical section depends on your work. The subject and the way it is handled will determine the arrangement. The text should not be divided into excessively short fragments. The conclusions should be in harmony with the introduction. It should include a concise presentation of the aim of the research, the main content and the main findings. Full paper must be an understandable entity by someone that has not attended the session at the conference.

Full papers must be submitted **in MS Word Format (.doc) or Rich text Format (.rtf)**, NOT in .pdf – format. If author does not follow the given instructions, the editorial board may modify the text or even decide not to publish it. Please use 1.5 spacing in the text.

Notes should be avoided, but if used, should be placed as endnotes before the references.

Acknowledgements of people, grants, funds, etc. should be placed in a separate section before the references.

Figures and tables should be included in the text of the article. Captions should include keys to symbols. Each figure and table should be titled and numbered.
